HOW TO QUEST:

You are holding a treasure map! Follow the movement clues (italicized) between stops (numbered) to ride the tides and discover how Humboldt Bay produces a swell home for people, plants, and animals. At your final destination you will find your Quest Clue. This is a "key" to your prize! (See "Now that you've finished..." section for your next step).

#### KNOW BEFORE YOU GO:

MARINA AREA: Paddlers are not always visible to exiting boats. Stay in the main channel and out of the boat slip area.

SHORT HORN BLASTS: One long blast or five short blasts from a nearby vessel signals immediate DANGER. Be aware of your distance from moving boats at all times.


















Look on the docks, what do you see?

Stacks of crates from the fishing industry.

It's important to keep this water clean and safe,

because the local fish may end up on your plate.

Paddle across the bay channel towards the marina. Pause

at the end of the boat dock. The boat dock 'slips' house

many different types of fishing vessels and pleasure craft.

People have long fished Humboldt Bay,

for oysters, clams and catch of the day.

Its fog horn and lights once signaled to ships.

Honoring today those sailors lost at sea.

The Table Bluff Lighthouse holds quite a bit of history,

Pause about halfway, you'll see the patio of Café Marina.

¿ Let's play a game of "how many boats can you spot?"

Each boat has a name and what harbor it's from.

From trawlers to trollers, there sure are a lot!

Paddle towards the Samoa Bridge along the marina, but do not go

between the boat slips as you may not be visible to moving boats.

BEGIN AT THE PUBLIC DOCK IN FRONT OF THE HUMBOLDT BAY AQUATIC CENTER, USE THE TRAIL MAP ON THE OTHER SIDE RIDE THE TIDES TO DISCOVER HOW HUMBOLDT BAY OFFERS A 'SWELL' HOME FOR ANIMALS, AQUATIC LIFE AND YOU!

Your first stop will be on the same side as this dock. Pause at the next dock down on your left, near the fishing building.

The Carson Mansion sits above these tracks. A modern reminder of past lumberjacks.

From here, head toward a big green Victorian home perched

4 Imagine a railroad that ran by the bay,

Those rails hauled lumber to towns far away.

above the Bay. Point your watercraft toward it for Stop 4.

Stay on your current side of the channel, and continue heading towards the Samoa Bridge. Stop to examine the dock near the bridge.

See what aquatic life you can spot Living alongside this sturdy dock. Barnacles, crabs, and eelgrass too, Make Humboldt Bay home, just like you.

> 6 Along with small creatures come big ones as well, Like harbor seals and waterbirds who think the Bay is swell. Look skyway and you will see the Pacific Flyway. Birds of all feathers employ this place of travel, Finding food and rest along the Bay channel.

Be aware of any moving vessels. When clear, paddle out

Wildlife Viewing Etiquette

Pass far so you do not impact animals. Approach indirectly and avoid direct confrontation.

Discreetly view from a distance.

Defer when you observe behavior changes. L eave wildlife alone.

Explain that protecting wildlife protects paddling.

Paddle toward Woodley Island Marina's small cement public dock along the rocky shore. Pull up for a rest before you turn around.




